

Novi Most has been runnning regular winter camps now for probably ten years. These have usually been a five-day camp, with the middle three days spent on a mountain, learning to snowboard. Last year we decided to try something new: to run two camps, a shorter one specifically for teenagers and the normal camp for students and those just out of education. Both camps went well so we decided to repeat the experiment this year. The Teen Winter Camp happened at the beginning of January, the second Winter Camp will take place in the first full week of February.

Our Director Beki gives you his thoughts on this year's first Winter Camp.

"This winter, we had the privilege of organising a snowboarding and skiing camp for 21 teenagers from four different cities in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Witnessing these young individuals form lasting friendships while experiencing personal growth, outdoor adventures, and spiritual development was truly gratifying. As they honed their snowboarding and skiing skills, the joy of seeing them overcome fears and push their limits created unforgettable memories.

Unfortunately, due to limited space, we had to decline numerous parents' requests for their kids to join. Despite the challenge, it presents an opportunity for future restructuring and expansion, highlighting Novi Most as a trusted partner in fostering essential youth development."

DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES ON WINTER!


When we say "Bosnia and Herzgovina" the country name is also a description of two different bits of geography. Put simply, Bosnia is the north of the country which has forested mountains and snowy winters; Herzegovina is the south of the country, with bare, rocky mountains and very hot summers. While it's normal for children in Bosnia to grow up sledging or skiing every year, young people who have grown up in Herzegovina may not have had the chance to play in the snow very often.

Indira is our Novi Most worker in Mostar, which is in Herzegovina. She explains what Winter Camp meant to the young people who she brought.

"We brought eight young people from Mostar who were very excited about the camp and about something new they would learn, because they had not had the opportunity to learn snowboarding before. Of the eight, two learned to snowboard and were surprised and happy that they had mastered a new skill.

While we were at the camp, the young people enjoyed socialising and the snow. It was encouraging to see them step out of their comfort zone into something new. And the whole camp was an unforgettable experience for them, and they can't wait for the winter camp next year."

- The quality of the work by the Jajce team remains exceptional. I felt I caught a little of the vision to inspire young people to song writing, recording and worship leading, and it left me wanting to catch a lot more!
